

## EARLY LANGUAGE & LITERACY MINI GRANT AWARDS JANUARY 2018

### ABOUT THE MINI GRANT AWARDEES

The Early Language and Literacy Mini Grant Program, a joint effort between the Governor's Office of Student Achievement and the Sandra Dunagan Deal Center for Early Language and Literacy at Georgia College, supports partnerships in projects targeting the language and literacy development needs of children ages zero to eight. For this grant round, traditional public schools, charter schools, school districts, nonprofit organizations, and community organizations could apply for grant funds. Eligible organizations could apply as a single entity and receive between \$5,000 and \$20,000. Alternatively, they could apply as multiple entities – allowing them to maximize the scope of their projects and receive between \$5,000 and \$20,000 for *each entity* included in the application. Therefore, some projects received more than \$20,000. However, the funding will support multiple agencies. The summaries below include the applicant(s) involved in each project as well as a description of each project's goals.

<b>Award Amount</b>	\$20,000.00
<b>Project Name</b>	Albany State University Early Language and Literacy Project
<b>Program Description</b>	The Albany State University (ASU) Early Learning Center, in partnership with the Dougherty County School System, the ASU Library System, the ASU College of Education, and other local child development centers, will implement an early childhood literacy program for children two-years old through Pre-K. The program's goal is to increase the percentage of Dougherty County students reading at or above their grade level target by the end of kindergarten.

<b>Project Name</b>	Augusta University Early Literacy Program
<b>Program Description</b>	The Augusta University Early Literacy Program will support Richmond County child care programs that strive to deliver high-quality early care to children from birth through Pre-K. To accomplish this goal, it will provide training and resources to Richmond County School's Pre-K teachers to ensure students enter kindergarten ready to learn. In addition, the program will identify children who are struggling academically and behaviorally. These children will receive support through occupational therapy assessments and interventions targeting their social emotional and language and literacy development needs.

<b>Award Amount</b>	\$17,933.08
<b>Project Name</b>	Babies to Bookworms
<b>Program Description</b>	Seminole County Family Connection, in partnership with Donalsonville Hospital's Women's Center, will create an educational support group for expecting mothers. The support group will educate expecting mothers on topics such as early language exposure for babies, proper nutrition, and labor and delivery. New mothers will also receive supplies to help support their children's development and language and literacy needs, including board books, diapers, and wipes.

<b>Project Name</b>	Barrow Book Partnership
<b>Program Description</b>	The Barrow Book Partnership (BBP) will improve the early literacy skills of children ages zero to five by promoting talking, reading, and interacting with children during their most critical stage of brain development. Specifically, BBP will provide parents and caregivers free books and connect them with free early literacy programs offered by their local public libraries.

<b>Project Name</b>	Bartow County Reading Outreach Program

The Literacy Champions will also host monthly workshops that build the capacity of families to support their children's literacy development at home.

In addition, approximately 60 pre-service teachers will receive literacy coaching as they help lead the Summer Literacy Camps – preparing them to teach literacy in their future classrooms.

<b>Program Description</b>	Board Books and Booster Shots will serve children experiencing homelessness in the Our House Early Childhood Education program. Specifically, the grant will allow Our House to purchase the Teaching Strategies GOLD assessment system for preschool teachers. In addition, nurse practitioners will provide free, specialized, and comprehensive health care to children through the Community Advanced Practice Nurses' Pediatric Comprehensive Assessment Program.

Teachers will then train parents and caregivers on these same strategies – enabling them to support their children's literacy development at home.

In addition to teachers, these trainings will serve family members and representatives from Richmond Hill Public Library and the Bryan County Family Connection. Family members will receive information and resources to further build their children's literacy skills at home.
